

I encourage each of you to think about what makes you passionate and find a volunteer project to match your interests.



COMMUNITY INITIATIVES



Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (DPIL) is a program that promotes early-childhood literacy by providing one free book a month to children living in Cumberland County, ages birth to 5. Through our partnership with DPIL, Smart Start, and Partnership for Children of Cumberland County, children build their own library of books and are encouraged to develop a love for reading and learning. Studies show that frequency of reading is determined by access to reading materials and children who have favorite books when they're young, tend to do better in school. DPIL sets important foundations for educational achievement and lifelong reading. Since its inception, 546,495 books have been mailed.

days a week, in any language. NC 211 serves as a health and human services referral line that helps all Cumberland County residents in need of help. Local sponsors include the City of Fayetteville, Cumberland County and the Fayetteville Public Works Commission. Last year, 11,616 calls were received by NC 211 for Cumberland County Residents. The top requests were: 1. Housing and Shelter (Rent Assistance, Temporary Shelters, Low-Cost Housing): 5,417 calls; 2. Utility Assistance: 2,802 calls; 3. Employment & Income (Financial Assistance):960 calls; 4. Support, Advocacy & Special Population Services: 539 calls 5. Government & Legal Assistance (Evictions): 403 calls; 6. Food (Help Buying Food and Food Pantries): 588 calls; 7. Healthcare & COVID-19: 362 calls; 8. Clothing & Household: 179 calls; 9. Mental Health & Addictions: 172 calls; and 10. Transportation Assistance: 97 calls



The Leadership Development Program is a 10-week program that develops the necessary skills to become effective, responsible leaders of the community. A special emphasis is on preparation for participation on local boards and committees. This free training program enhances leadership skills and incorporates discussion and informative sessions, led by community leaders. Since its inception, there have been 460 graduates from the Program and over 378 are currently volunteering in leadership roles.



EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER PROGRAM (EFSP)

Cumberland County was awarded \$124,180 under Phase 39 of the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) to help supplement and expand local emergency food and shelter programs. Congress appropriated \$383.811 supplemental funding under the American Rescue Plan Act Regular (ARPAR) EFSP to respond to COVID-19's impact on Cumberland County, Local Recipient Organizations will use EFSP funds for emergency shelters, community feeding programs, food distribution through food pantries, food banks and food vouchers, past due utility payments to prevent service disconnections, past due rent/mortgage assistance to prevent evictions and to assist people that are leaving shelters with establishing stable living conditions. Residents in need of assistance must contact the agency directly to check for availability of funds.

About EFSP: The National Board designated United Way of Cumberland County to serve as the administrator to the local board. The local board is comprised of representatives from Cumberland Interfaith Hospitality Network, Cumberland County Coordinating Council on Older Adults, The Salvation Army, Beth Israel Federated Charities, Catholic Charities, Cumberland County Department of Social Services, Fayetteville Urban Ministry, Cumberland County Community Development, American Red Cross, Cumberland County Indian Housing Authority, Cumberland County Schools, Fayetteville VA Medical Center, and United Way of Cumberland County.

The EFSP Local Board's responsibility is to:

Consider all private voluntary and public organizations currently providing or capable of providing Emergency food and shelter programs. Select and recommend which local organizations should receive funding and the amounts of the funding awards. Advertise the availability of funds. Establish priorities among community needs.

Award funds to nonprofit and government emergency food and shelter agencies.

Monitor program compliance to Rules and Regulations set forth by the National EFSP Board.
